THARAWONGA CONTINUES TO SERVICE OUTLYING COMMUNITIES

A mobile preschool that offers non-profit, caring and friendly childhood, play-based education to families across five small communities in the Gwydir Shire that runs weekly may sound too good to be true, but Tharawonga Mobile Resource Unit provides all this in our own backyard and is currently nearing it's 30th year.

Tharawonga is classified as a long day care service and opens its travelling doors to children between the ages of 2 - 6 years.

Children of North Star, Croppa Creek, Yetman, Gravesend and Yallaroi continue to benefit from the fun, early learning service provided by educators that are invested in providing opportunities to children, no matter where they live.

Young people are offered experiences that nurture childhood development, skills and social opportunities. A quality start to education is essential and Tharawonga Director, Emma Read, says that the service can help parents reach the 15 hours per week of early childhood education recommended by the NSW State Government's Start Strong for Community Preschool's program.

"At Tharawonga, the idea is to offer the same access to early childhood experiences as any regular preschool service," Emma said.

The days are full of action with a vast range of activities on offer on any one day. Tharawonga's vehicles are loaded up at the start of each week with all manner of toys, craft supplies and equipment that would be utilised in any other preschool or day care service.



"Mobile services are very organised. You've got to be because if you don't have the things that you need, there is no going back," she said.

In the past month the service has undergone an accreditation assessment – the first of its kind for providers such as this across NSW. Whilst the process was rigorous Tharawonga Director, Emma Read, says that expectations of accreditation are already met each day in order to offer their program to the region's young people.

"We had a couple of periods of disruption over the past years due to COVID-19. During this time we created packs of things the children could do at home with their families, mostly via email, to provide that opportunity," she said.

Amongst the activities offered were packets of seed that were sent home. Following simple instructions, children were able to grow plants such as broccoli and send in photos to staff.

Back in the community halls that allow the service to operate, children paint, play, read, ride and interact with each other and staff, before it is time to pack the whole lot up and start again in a new place, on another day.

Earlier this year Gwydir Shire Council's customer service centre in Warialda was relocated from the Council building in Hope Street where it was housed for many years, to the Visitor Information Centre located on the corner of Geddes Street and Holden Street.

This move was initiated by Council to allow for a more efficient use of staff resources and to facilitate an increase in Service NSW hours from three days a week, to five days later in the year.

I am pleased to announce that as of the 1 June these changes have taken affect. with the agency now open two additional half days each week, on Monday and Thursday mornings.

This increase in hours is excellent news for residents, providing greater convenience and access to this service.

I am also pleased to announce that Gwydir Shire has been selected as one of six LGAs across NSW identified for the Regional Drought Resilience Planning pilot program. As part of this program Gwydir Shire Council is working with the University of New England (UNE) to host a series of workshops in the towns and villages within the Gwydir Shire, starting next week.

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Seven workshops in total will be held, with the aim of harnessing the knowledge and experience of our community in relation to drought mitigation and preparedness.

The information gathered will be used to develop a drought resilience plan for our Shire. The plan will identify strategies to help future proof our community against rising temperatures and reoccurring drought conditions across the board, from farming practices and urban design to social planning.

Through this process we are hoping to identify practical and effective ways to help our community get through the tough times.

I urge as many people as possible to attend these workshops so we can be more resilient and better prepared for drought conditions in the future.

The 2022/2023 Council budget is now on display and will be reconsidered and adopted at the June meeting of Council. It is during this display period that residents have an opportunity to make comment. If you would like to view the budget, please visit Council's website. If you would like to provide feedback, please do so in writing before 24 June 2022.

Finally, delegates from Gwydir Shire Council will be attending the Australian Local Government Conference in Canberra this month, providing excellent opportunity to speak to Federal politicians about various concerns that may arise.

MARK COULTON APPOINTED WHAT IS AN IP&R DOCUMENT NATIONALS' CHIEF WHIP

Federal Member for Parkes Mark Coulton has been appointed as the National Party's Chief Whip. The appointment comes following the announcement of the Coalition's shadow ministry on Sunday.

Having served as a Member of Parliament for more than 14 years, Mr Coulton brings a wealth of experience to the role of Chief Whip - a position he previously held for two terms, from 2010 to 2016.

"This is an important role, particularly as the Nationals now find themselves in opposition," Mr Coulton said.

"I believe my experience as the longest-serving Nationals member in the House of Representatives will be useful to help the Party continue to be the strong voice for regional Australia."

Mr Coulton has held a number of different roles since he was first elected to the House of Representatives in 2007. Most recently, he served as the Minister for Regional Health, Regional Communications and Local Government from February 2020 until July 2021.

He was previously the Minister for Regional Services, Decentralisation and Local Government, and Assistant Minister for Trade, Tourism and Investment. Mr Coulton also held the position of Deputy Speaker of the House of Representatives from 2016 to 2018.

As Nationals' Chief Whip, Mr Coulton will be responsible for organising the National Party members in the House of Representatives.

The Integrated Planning and Reporting (IP&R) framework changed the way Councils in NSW planned, documented and reported on their plans for the future. The Framework came into practice in 2009 and many councils have refined the way they create and review these plans over the subsequent years.

It is intended that the IP&R Framework begins with the community's, not Council's, aspirations for a period of at least 10 years and include plans that set out a vision and goals and strategic actions to achieve them. It also involves a reporting structure to communicate progress to Council and the community as well as a structured timeline for review to ensure the goals and actions are still relevant.

The Operational Plan clearly states the projects that will be delivered by each of Council's services and capital works projects that are scheduled.

"These documents are created from the Community Strategic Plan which is a plan created by you, the community," said Gwydir Shire Council's IP&R and Governance Officer, Casey McClymont.

"This Plan is your opportunity to provide input into the future of Gwydir Shire and work alongside Council and other relevant organisations to contribute to achieve the communities vision "Gwydir Country – Fresh air, Innovation, Opportunity and Resilience."

Regional Drought Resilience Planning will begin in the Gwydir and Inverell Local Government Areas (LGA) shortly.

Selected as one of six LGAs across NSW identified for the Regional Drought Resilience Planning pilot program, Gwydir and Inverell Councils will be working with the University of New England (UNE) to host a series of workshops in the towns and villages within the Gwydir and Inverell regions.

Fourteen workshops in total will be held, with the aim of harnessing the knowledge and experience of locals in relation to drought mitigation and preparedness.

The information gathered will be used to develop a drought resilience plan for the Gwydir and Inverell communities. The plan will identify strategies to help future proof these communities against rising temperatures and reoccurring drought conditions across the board, from farming practices and urban design to social planning.

General Manager of Gwydir Shire Council, Max Eastcott, said the program would provide the Gwydir community with important insight in terms of drought resilience and planning.

"Through this process we are hoping to identify practical and effective ways to help our community get through the tough times", Mr Eastcott said.

"This initiative will allow us to better understand how our community as a whole can be more resilient and better prepared for future drought conditions."

The Regional Drought Resilience Planning Program is being delivered as part of the Future Ready Regions Strategy, with joint funding from the Commonwealth Government's Future Drought Fund and NSW

The Regional Drought Resilience Planning Program aims to empower regional communities to plan for the future by working with local councils, NSW Government agencies, communities and industries to become more resilient against the impacts of drought and other challenges.

Power prices pressure farmers

The state's peak farming body has asked the NSW Government to invest in small scale on-farm renewables to ease cost pressures for food producers.

The cost of electricity has nearly tripled in the past decade, according to Reg Kidd from the NSW Farmers Energy Transition Working Group, who said regional and rural users already paid 25 per cent more than urban users.

"This is a huge cost for country people, but it's especially felt by those high energy users such as intensive livestock producers," Mr Kidd said.

"Many farm businesses are seeking efficiencies and certainty of energy supply by installing solar or other renewable generation, backed up by batteries, and while the costs of these are gradually reducing, they are still a major infrastructure investment to meet business rather than residential requirements."

"NSW Farmers is asking the state government for investment in farm businesses, including subsidies and low interest loans, to install renewable energy generation and storage."

"For primary producers, Energy Sustainability Rebates have the potential to reduce reliance on fossil fuels and reduce carbon emissions," Mr Kidd said. With food being a major output of agricultural operation, all Australians had a stake in ensuring farms could transition to clean, affordable and reliable energy.

"Without reliable energy supply the fresh product can quickly spoil and result in shortages," Mr Kidd said.

"By installing renewable energy systems primary producers increase certainty across their business operations and contribute to economy-wide carbon emission reduction targets."

"Decision makers serious about these targets should support farmers investing in energy efficient or own-generation technology, which will also improve reliability of local electricity supply."

GROWING NUMBERS HIGHLIGHT CHANGING ATTITUDE TO WATER RULES

NSW continues to add to its tally of water law compliance with 1233 enforcement actions taken since the Natural Resources Access Regulator (NRAR) began public reporting of data in 2019.

Cumulative quarterly reporting figures show that NRAR has carried out an average of 112 enforcement actions in each quarter, across the state, since mid-2019.

NRAR Chief Regulatory Officer Grant Barnes said quarterly figures for January to March this year highlighted changing attitudes to complying with water laws in NSW.

It comes as only one investigation for the Gwydir Local Government Area was received and finalised, with no formal notices, penalty infringements or statutory notices issued.

"We've been very successful in encouraging a shift towards voluntary compliance among the state's water users," Mr Barnes said. "Part of that has been actively enforcing the law, we have more than 4000 completed investigations under our belt, but part has also been in our commitment to transparent reporting," Mr Barnes said.

"We put forward our enforcement figures every quarter for people to see what we do," he said.

"For example, our busiest year in terms of enforcement actions was 2020 when there were 563 actions resulting in either fines, directions to stop or carry out work, or formal warnings."

"This was boosted by the introduction of satellite surveillance and other technology to NRAR's compliance monitoring tools around that time."


"This quarter's enforcement action numbers are lower than some periods in previous years due in part to our proactive approach. We're more proactive to raise awareness of the rules and intervene early to prevent ongoing harm."

The online reporting tool allows users to see the numbers at state, regional and local scale.

State-wide statistics for the first three months of 2022 included:

- 2589 property inspections, including both desktop audits and onsite visits
- 44 enforcement actions, including 11 penalty infringement notices, 23 formal warnings and 10 directions to carry out remedial work or stop work
- 265 investigations were finalised
- 15 prosecutions active in court

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MAYOR PUSHING COUNTRY HEALTH OUTCOMES TO THE TOP

Following the tabling in Parliament of the Legislative Council Inquiry into Health Outcomes and Access to Health and Hospital Services in Rural, Regional and Remote NSW on 5 May 2022, the Country Mayors Association of NSW organised a Rural Health Forum in Sydney on 6 May 2022. Councillors Egan and Galvin attended together with the Mayor, Cr Coulton.

"The forum was well attended and the presenters included the Hon. Minister Bronnie Taylor MLC, Minister for Regional Health and Minister for Mental Health, Mr Ryan Park, Shadow Minister for Health and Mental Health, Mr Richard Colbran, Chief Executive Officer, Rural Doctors Network, and Adjunct Professor, Ruth Stewart, National Rural Health Commissioner of Australia, who were excellent," said Mayor Cr Coulton.

The Mayor went on to state that it was refreshing to hear that both Minister Taylor and Shadow Minister Ryan agreed that it was of the utmost importance that the consideration and debate on this very important matter of Regional and Rural Health should be approached on a bipartisan basis and should be bought before Parliament as early as possible.

The Mayor noted that the Inquiry found what everybody in regional and rural NSW knows, that health and hospital services in country NSW are below standard when compared to the service levels experienced by those residing in metropolitan areas.

Gwydir's Mayor, Cr John Coulton, is urging all regional and rural councils to get behind the efforts of the Country Mayors Association of NSW in its efforts to ensure that all 44 recommendations of the Inquiry are adopted by Parliament, by writing to the Premier and the Leader of the Opposition, requesting favourable outcomes, by adopting the Inquiry's recommendations that will ensure a marked improvement in the delivery of all aspects of health care to country NSW residents.

This is our opportunity to redress the deficiencies in regional and rural health delivery.

"We cannot let our communities down," said Cr Coulton, in conclusion.

Guest speaker, Kelly Foran of Friendly Faces Helping Hands, spoke about her foundation which aims to provide help and information to families who find themselves in a medical emergency situation far from home. Kelly and her family have been through some stressful medical situations and was able to share some of her experiences on the morning.

Chris Connors also spoke to the gathering, reminding guests about the importance of following up on medical irregularities noticed having regular mammograms and bowel cancer testing. In 2021, Carinda House donated \$1000 to Friendly Faces Helping Hands.

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KNOW YOUR DRONE

As prices have come down, the increase is use of drones in a recreational capacity has surged, along with complaints about safety and privacy breaches. It has been noted in local townships that drones have been hovering over residential dwellings at a particularly low height, breaching the rules of flying in populous areas.

Operators of drones are required by law, to abide by regulations regarding the use of their drone and are limited in where and how they may operate.

Amongst other safety rules operators must always fly their drone in visual line-of-sight (flying only during the day), avoid flying through cloud, fog or smoke and be able to always see the drone with their own eyes — not by using goggles, binoculars or another device.

A drone must not fly higher than 120 m (400 ft) above ground, closer than 30 m to people — other than those helping to control or navigate your drone, over or above people at any time or height or near emergency operations.

A full list of safety rules can be found at https://www.casa.gov.au/ drones/drone-rules/drone-safety-rules. Breaking the rules can result in operational restrictions, fines or jail.

Meanwhile, the Australian Government has agreed to defer mandatory recreational drone registration and operator accreditation until 1 July 2023.



Registration for recreational operators was scheduled to commence in mid-2022, with the decision to delay registration following the introduction of registration for commercial and excluded category operators on 30 September 2020.

The new rules for recreational drones will require operators to gain accreditation by watching an online video and successfully answering a short quiz to demonstrate they understand the drone safety rules.

The new registration and accreditation requirements will apply to all drones operated recreationally that weigh more than 250 grams.

In addition, CASA has a verified list of drone-related applications, the latest of which is ScaleFlyt, developed by IT specialist, Thales.

CASA-verified apps provide customised, location-based information along with easy-to-use maps that display where you can and can't fly your drone in accordance with aviation legislation.

Before taking flight, drone operators are encouraged to check a CASA-verified drone safety app to access accurate information about where they can and can't fly.

POLICE DESTROY THOUSANDS OF FIREARMS

More than three tonnes of firearms will be destroyed this month – melted down into steel and produced into other items – after being seized and gathered by police across the state.

The haul of 2809 firearms (totalling 3228kg) have come into police possession after being seized through criminal investigations, located as abandoned property, and surrendered.

Among the items to be destroyed are pistols, rifles, shotguns, military firearms, home-made firearms, airsoft, gel blasters, air pistols and air rifles.

Police Commissioner, Karen Webb, said every firearm destroyed is a win for police and the community.

"We've all seen the harm that is caused by the unlawful use of firearms and the fear it can cause within the broader community," Commissioner Webb said.

"Some of these items are collected through long term, complex criminal investigations and others are located through isolated search warrants and police incidents."

"By destroying these weapons, we prevent any that are kept for legitimate purposes falling into the wrong hands and used in other crimes."



Each week, hundreds of firearms are collected by police in Police Area Commands, Police Districts and specialist Commands and sent to the NSW Police Weapons and Ordnance Disposal Unit. Each item is then audited and processed for destruction.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Police, Paul Toole, said police continued to crack down on illegal criminal activity which regularly involved the seizures of firearms, ammunition and other weapons.

"We know the vast majority of those in our community possess firearms for a valid reason – and then there are those who use these weapons to inflict fear and cause serious harm to others," Mr Toole said.

"Police across the state are committed to getting those weapons off our street to keep our community safe."

NSW CUSTOMERS HAVE THEIR SAY ON DIGITAL IDENTITY

Customers are helping to shape the future of digital identity and digital government in NSW by joining the conversation through Have Your Say community consultations.

Executive Director of Identity.NSW Lenka Bradovkova said collaborating with customers was the best way to ensure the Digital Identity program made a real impact in people's lives.

"The NSW Government is aiming to be the most customer-centric government by 2030, and customers have been very clear with us on their priorities," Ms Bradovkova said.

"These surveys help us learn what programs our customers are currently engaging with, with nearly half of all respondents already using some form of digital identity or credential, and about 80 per cent of those using the NSW government's Digital Driver Licence, COVID-19 vaccination certificate and the Dine & Discover NSW vouchers.

"The Have Your Say consultations on digital identity and verifiable credentials has received more than 6,300 unique responses, including 2,700 survey responses.

"Customers have expressed their interest in a range of future possibilities including digital birth certificates or educational credentials being part of the digital solution."

Ms Bradovkova said the Have Your Say consultations were instrumental in understanding what the key priorities of the state's customers were when they consider using a Digital Identity or credential.

"It is clear in the results that when using or sharing their identity digitally our customers value having control of their own information. They want to be in charge of what information they share and when they share it," Ms Bradovkova said.

"The survey also reinforced customers want to be given the option to opt-in to the program, with ongoing consent required each time they choose to share information.

"Privacy, cyber security and fraud prevention are seen as the most important benefits for customers."

"We are going to try and do some landscaping there and get the bathrooms done up, then connect it through the Vicarage and bring customers in. We are hoping to beautify North Star a little bit more," said Mr Hardcastle. "We are always thinking – what can we do nex?"

Federal Member for Parkes Mark Coulton recently visited Naroo and said the injection of funds will be used for significant infrastructure improvements to the outdoor space at the aged care facility.

"Our elderly people deserve access to quality aged care services, and I'm pleased this funding will ensure aged care residents in Warialda will be able to live in greater comfort," Mr Coulton said.

"Naroo is particularly close to my heart, as my father spent many years on the board before becoming a resident himself, so I know just how important it is to ensure our loved ones can access suitable care as they get older."

"This funding represents more than just bricks and mortar; it's about reinforcing the future of care for seniors in the Gwydir Shire. It offers peace-of-mind and security not only for those already in care and their families but also local residents who are carefully considering the next phase of their life."

Naroo Manager Sharon Baker welcomed this funding, and said it will be used to undertake a makeover of the gardens, creating a more accessible, shaded outdoor space for the residents to enjoy.

"The project will open up the lounge room and the activities room to the gardens with new doors and windows, while sun shading and planting throughout the gardens will improve the outdoor space for all residents," Ms Baker said.

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"This will provide a safe and comfortable space for residents to enjoy with their family and friends."

Minister for Senior Australians and Aged Care Services Richard Colbeck said the investment reflects the Coalition Government's commitment to greater respect, care and dignity for senior Australians no matter where they live.

"Investing in aged care infrastructure means we can improve the quality and safety of residential aged care from the ground up," Minister Colbeck said.

"We have our Mitigation Teams Machinery Operators and generalised crews moving into Warialda over the next few days to complete the works."

NSW Rural Fire Service will be working on Council and private land blocks with Soil Conservation Service working on public lands.

The project will continue over the next month and aims to offer increased protection from bushfire to the township.

Jointly funded by the NSW RFS and Crown Lands, it is hoped that Warialda residents can rest easier in future bushfire events.

SALMON FISHING IN YEMEN

The North West Theatre Company Film Club's June movie is Salmon Fishing in the Yemen, a 2011 British romantic comedy-drama directed by Lasse Hallström and starring Ewan McGregor, Emily Blunt, Kristin Scott Thomas and Amr Waked and based on the 2007 novel of the same name by Paul Torday.

Fisheries expert Alfred Jones (Ewan McGregor) receives an email from financial adviser Harriet Chetwode - Talbot (Emily Blunt), seeking advice on a project to bring salmon fishing to the Yemen - a project being bankrolled by a wealthy Yemeni sheikh and supported by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office. Alfred dismisses the project as fundamentally unfeasible because Yemen cannot provide the necessary environment for salmon.

Meanwhile, the British Prime Minister's press secretary, Patricia Maxwell (Kristin Scott Thomas), suggests the salmon fishing story to the Prime Minister's office as a positive story to help improve relations between Britain and the Islamic world.

Harriet arranges for Alfred to meet the Sheikh (Amr Waked) at his estate in the Scottish Highlands. The Sheikh is excited to meet Alfred as he is the inventor of the 'Woolly Jones' fishing fly. While the Sheikh acknowledges that the project may sound crazy, he still believes that fishing is a noble pursuit that promotes harmony and requires immense faith.

The film was shot on location in London, Scotland and Morocco and premiered at the 2011 Toronto International Film Festival. It earned over \$34 million and received generally favourable reviews from critics with the consensus stating: "Quirky and a little reserved, Salmon Fishing in the Yemen is nonetheless a charming little romantic drama sold by some strong central performances."

Salmon Fishing in the Yemen shows on Sunday June 26 at the Roxy, Bingara at 4:00pm. New members are welcome, with membership for this and the remaining five films for the year is \$36.



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LOCAL AUTHORS BRINGS ROCK'N'ROLL TO LIFE

This year's Bingara Orange Festival on Saturday 2 July will feature a book publication and book launch with a central theme of R 'n' R. Cantella tells the story a station property and its sixteen year old heir apparent Floyd Vallis who, to the dismay of his estranged parents, turns his back upon his heritage to become a national R 'n' R star.

Cantella's historical fiction is interwoven with real people, times, places and events and this allows the book to recreate and capture the 1950s conduct of baby boomers who were stimulated by R 'n' R's music and revolted against societal and parental control.

Outlandish clothes were worn by "Bodgies" and "Widgies" and this exclusive youth movement was fanned by controversial and larger than life performers like Elvis Presley, Little Richard, Buddy Holly, Chuck Berry and others whom devotees admired and sought to emulate.

Ray Roberts, Australia's leading entrepreneur and promoter imports a bevy of overseas stars and their raucous, flamboyant behaviour brands Sydney as the epicentre of Australia's R 'n' R culture.

Roberts grooms Floyd to overnight success as a R 'n' R performer and Floyd remains Australia's leading exponent for R 'n' R's duration. Floyd's career plays out in an environment where he falls heavily for Robert's beautiful illegitimate daughter, talented jazz singer Linda Carroll. However, Linda's talent leads her to international success in America.

Floyd sustains injuries in a late night car accident and his parents rush to his side in Sydney. As he recuperates, Floyd returns to convalesce with his reunited parents at Cantella. There, he meets Carmel an attractive unspoilt, freshly scrubbed country girl who makes him uneasy about the extent of his own conversion. A romance develops but there are complications.

By 1959 R 'n' R is a spent force and Floyd Valentine's entertainment career may be over as he contemplates the possibility of life without fame. Extraneous circumstances develop that prompts Floyd to choose between the two very different women



in his life. In addition, he must also decide whether his lifestyle allegiances lie with the excitement and glamour of the entertainment world, or with Cantella, the family dynasty and sense of place created by his forebears.



CARING FOR CARERS

Anyone, at any time, can become a Carer. While many don't use the word 'carer' to describe themselves, it is an individual who provides care and support to a family member or friend who lives with a disability, mental illness, alcohol or drug dependency, chronic condition, terminal illness or who is frail due to age. The 2.65 million carers around the country come from all walks of life, cultural backgrounds and age groups. They work quietly and lovingly without fanfare making an incredible contribution to the lives of many.

As a carer, I have gained great satisfaction in helping improve the quality of life for someone who needed me, deepening an important relationship and serving my family and friends by shouldering a burden when others couldn't. While this was a privilege and incredibly rewarding, it was extremely demanding taking a lot of personal time, energy and resources. Without the right support, caring can affect your health and wellbeing, while limiting our ability to participate in family life, paid work and social activities.

We know:

• Nearly half of the carers report high to very high levels of psychological distress.

• Carers often do not have the time or

energy to prioritise their own health. Nearly 2 in 3 carers have a chronic health condition, compared to 1 in 3 Australians overall.

- More than half of the carers are socially isolated.
- Nearly 2 in 3 carers have less than 10 hours per week to themselves.
- 1 in 4 carers leave a paid job to care, and 1 in 3 had reduced their working hours.
- Half of the carers have experienced financial stress in the past 12 months.

SO, WHO CARES FOR THE CARER?

Being a carer takes a toll both physically and emotionally, so it's important to invest in looking after ourselves or provide the support carers need through:

Personally

- Eating well and sleeping well don't work from an empty tank.
- Learning skills to pro-actively manage stress.
- Finding time to exercise getting out
- creates mental and physical benefits.

• Ask for help or say yes to respite – park the guilt . It is ok to accept help, take regular breaks caring is often a marathon not a sprint.

• Join a support group (online/in-person) – talking to someone in a similar situation can



be powerful.

• Keeping up our own social connections.

As a community supporting a carer

- Create a network of considerate and supportive people around the carer.
- Volunteer to help with respite an hour, a morning or a day can mean so much.
- Be a shoulder to lean on listen not to fix, but hear their story and share the journey.

• Pick up the phone, check in, see how carer's are travelling – early support and encouragement to help when a carer struggles is key.

• Just be there.

FREE FLU SHOTS FOR ALL IN JUNE



A free flu jab will be available to all NSW residents in a monthlong blitz from June 1 in an effort to combat this year's expected severe influenza season.

With a sharp increase in flu cases already, the NSW Government will fund flu vaccinations at GPs and pharmacies until June 30.

Chief Health Officer Dr Kerry Chant said there were 1,140 cases of respiratory illness notified this week, compared with 766 in the previous week and 150 presentations and admissions to hospitals.

"We strongly urge everyone over six months of age to get a flu shot as soon as possible to protect themselves and their loved ones, as the virus is easily spread and potentially deadly," Dr Chant said.

"This is particularly important for those in high-risk groups, such as the elderly and children aged six months to five years. If you live in an aged or disability care facility, are aged over 65 or are immunocompromised, now is the time to book in."

"We also recommend a COVID-19 winter booster if you are eligible, as both flu and COVID-19 vaccines can be given at the same time."

The Commonwealth Government provides vaccines for vulnerable populations, and funds GPs through the MBS to administer vaccines. However, as COVID-19 has taught us, the role of pharmacies is crucial and the NSW Government is funding community pharmacies to deliver influenza vaccinations this June.

NSW Health has also permitted pharmacies to administer flu vaccines to children aged five years old, reduced from 10 years, making it easier for families to be vaccinated together. GPs will be reimbursed for any flu stock they have already purchased that is used in the month of June for this vaccination program.

The Commonwealth Government provides free flu vaccine for those considered to be at higher risk of severe illness from the flu, including:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people from six months of age
- Children from six months to under five years of age
- People with serious health conditions (including severe asthma, diabetes, cancer, immune disorders, obesity, kidney, heart, lung or liver disease)
- Pregnant women
- People aged 65 and over.

PHONE TOWER CAMPAIGN DELIVERS RESULTS: UPPER HORTON SET TO RECEIVE COVERAGE IMPROVEMENT

Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce is ticking off another achievement.

Mr Joyce said one of his long-held passions for New England is to reduce the number of mobile phone black spots.

"All too often, hills and valleys, which significantly contribute to the appeal of New England, play havoc with mobile and internet connections, leaving some centres without everyday communications," Mr Joyce said.

"In particular, the community of Upper Horton has conducted a passionate campaign for improved mobile phone services, and I have fought hard on their behalf."

"As a result, I am pleased to announce that under Round 2 of the Regional Connectivity Program (RCP), Upper Horton is to receive a welcome improvement to its mobile phone coverage," Mr Joyce said.

The project will deploy a new Telstra small cell mobile site, providing improved handheld coverage. The Federal Government contribution towards the project will be \$261,300.

Minister for Regional Communications, Bridget McKenzie said the project forms part of the Coalition Government's continuing roll-out of the \$257 million RCP.

"I acknowledge the support provided by Telstra's Northern NSW Regional General, Michael Marom and the efforts of Mr Arthur McDouall and his Tower Action Committee which gathered over 600 signatures for improved communication services."

"Since becoming the Member for New England, 51 mobile phone base stations have been secured for the electorate. This is the 52nd."

Mr Joyce added that upon being re-elected he would continue lobbying for even more phone towers, so as far as possible, New England communication black spots are reduced or completely eliminated.

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
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
