\$8.1 Million Warialda Bypass opened by NSW Governor General



Gwydir Shire Council Engineering Manager Alex Eddy, State Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall, NSW Governor Margaret Beazley AC QC, Federal Member for Parkes Mark Coulton, Gwydir Shire Council Mayor John Coulton and General Manager Max Eastcott officially opened the \$8.1 million Warialda heavy vehicle bypass

Construction of Warialda's new \$8.1 million heavy vehicle bypass near the Gwydir has been completed and was officially opened on Thursday May 5 by the NSW Governor General Her Excellency the Honourable Margaret Beazley AC QC.

The Govenor, was joined in Warialda by Federal Member for Parkes Mark Coulton, State Member for or Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall and Gwydir Shire Council Mayor John Coulton.

The 4.1-kilometre road will bypass the intersection of Stephen Street and Gwydir Highway providing a safe and direct route for high productivity freight vehicles travelling from north of Warialda east to Inverell or west to Moree along the Gwydir Highway. The project resolves a road freight pinchpoint at the intersection of Stephen Street in Warialda and the Gwydir Highway, which B-doubles cannot negotiate without crossing the centreline of both roads and road trains are unable to traverse at all.

This intersection is a known point of congestion and a significant hazard for heavy vehicles transporting their goods through Warialda. The bypass will allow heavy vehicles to avoid the intersection, directing trucks to the east of Warialda, over the new bridge on Warialda Creek and onto the Gwydir Highway.

Mr Marshall said the amount of earthmoving done over the life of the project was incredible. "To establish the route of the bypass, 55,000 cubic metres of material, including rock and vegetation, had to be cut away," he said.

"A portion of what was removed was used to build noise abatement banks on the Warialda side of the roadway.

"15,000 cubic metres of material has been filled and compacted to make the road base, with 10,000 cubic metres removed totally off site. The remaining 30,000 cubic metres has been used for noise retention barriers and the rehabilitation of gravel pits during construction.

"This has been a huge project for a small council to undertake alongside its regular

Local Emergency Services continue assistance in flood impacted areas

Local emergency service staff, including police and the rural fire service volunteers, continue to aid flood ravaged areas along the NSW coast.

Two months after the first of two recordbreaking floods impacted much of the Australian east coast, staff and volunteers have returned from shifts aiding victims of

the disasters.

Amongst the work completed, RFS volunteers spent their time clearing debris, using high pressure hoses to clear houses of mud and assisting residents with their housing.

Visiting from the New England Police District, NSW Police Force Rural Crime Prevention Team members provided a high visibility police presence in and around the Richmond area, conducting proactive patrols, supporting farmers and providing information to affected landholders on the available financial recovery grants and fodder.

Other police teams, including staff that service Gwydir Shire, were involved in door knocking, welfare checks and delivery of goods to isolated landholders.

regular road maintenance program. I congratulate all involved for the professionalism and expertise they have put into making this important piece of infrastructure a reality," Mr Marshall said.

Warialda is a vital part of the regional freight network, and these upgrades are forecast to create flow-on economic benefits across the supply chain.

Federal Member for Parkes Mark Coulton told the Gwydir News that this wasan exciting day for Warialda.

"After years in the making, it's wonderful to see this bypass operational and facilitating safer, more productive journeys for our truck drivers and other road users," Mr Coulton said.

"Warialda is a key part of the regional freight network, and this route provides access to the livestock exchange at Inverell, as well as abattoirs and other markets.



"These upgrades will mean local producers can use larger vehicles like road trains and B-triples, cutting transport costs and increasing overall productivity, while improving safety outcomes.

"This is a great example of all three levels of government working together for the benefit of the community. I commend Gwydir Shire Council on its vision and delivery of this important project."

Gwydir Shire Council Mayor John Coulton said the benefits of the bypass for regional producers are significant but will also benefit the wider community.

"These works will ease congestion on our local road network and ensure that Warialda's roads are safer for all motorists, particularly in the main retail district of Warialda."

Construction of the bypass has been made possible thanks to \$3,498,350 in funding from the Australian Government through the Bridges Renewal Program and \$3,043,200 million from the NSW Government under the Restart NSW Fixing Country Roads program, as well as \$5,000 from the Livestock Bulk and Rural Carriers Association, with Gwydir Shire Council contributing the remainder.





Applications for Off-farm Efficiency Program funding are open

Individuals and entities in the irrigation, urban and manufacturing sectors across the Murray Darling Basin can apply for funding under the Off-farm Efficiency Program.

The program is a \$1.54 billion Australian Government to upgrade water infrastructure to reduce water losses and increase water available for the environment. Water users and the community will also benefit from increased water reliability and the creation of job opportunities.

Three funding streams are available to potential applicants:

- **state-led streams:** for eligible medium to large scale off-farm initiatives for delivery in partnership with NSW Government
- grants hub: for eligible small off-farm projects up to the value of \$5 million
- **feasibility stream:** for eligible proposed projects to conduct preliminary investigations to inform a full-project proposal.

Applications for state-led, grants hub and feasibility streams are open, with all projects to be delivered by June 2024.

How we can help

Water Infrastructure NSW will assist applicants to develop projects for consideration by the Australian Government. All state-led and grants hub applications will require a 'letter of support' from the NSW Government to go with applications to the Australian Government.

HONOUR YOUR HEART WALK



Natasha Price with her dad Mick Ford and brother Wayne. They've been blown away by the support for a walk to honour their mum and wife and raise money for heart disease research.

Suddenly losing her mother at 57 to heart disease two years ago, Warialda's Natasha Price says the hardest thing has been knowing that her mum had an undiagnosed pre-existing condition.

Natasha's mum, also a long-time Warialda local, Deb Ford had a bout of rheumatic fever when she was a child. Little did she know that it left her with lasting heart damage. The loss of Deb was felt strongly by not only the family, but the Warialda community.

Natasha like her mum Deb, is passionate about organising and supporting community events. Natasha is one of the organisers of the Warialda Christmas Carnival and currently treasurer of the Primary School P&C. She's put her hand up to help on many sporting clubs, in treasurer and secretarial roles. Deb and Natasha started and ran the Warialda Honey Festival for many years before it was taken on by Gwydir Shire Council. They're both known as people who put their hands up when people need help or support.

Since losing her mother suddenly, besides dealing with the loss and supporting family, Natasha has had a recurring feeling that she wanted to bring attention to heart health, potentially helping someone else avoid losing their life and a loved one.

"My mum was also my best friend and partner in so many things, losing her was devastating for me and my family," Natasha said.

"One of the hardest things to accept has been knowing now that her heart had been affected all those years ago and we didn't know.

"There's nothing we can do to bring mum

back, but there is something we can do to save other lives.

"My mum was also a wife and grandmother, aunt and friend to everyone in town."

It was recently that Natasha came across the Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute, named after the brilliant Australian surgeon who pioneered the heart transplant, and performed the first one on Fiona Coote in 1984. The Institute, founded in 1994, is dedicated to finding cures for deadly heart and blood vessel conditions. The Institute attracts world class researchers with the desire and commitment to find enduring solutions, whilst providing the training ground for the next generation | of cardiovascular researchers.

To support the Institute and raise heart health awareness, Natasha is holding the 'Honour Your Heart Walk' in Warialda in July.

"My mum's maiden name is Honour, so it is the perfect name for our event, as I wanted to hold the event in honour of mum and it reminds us to care for our heart and be proactive about looking after it," Natasha said.

"Since deciding to do this about a month ago, I have been so humbled by the community and individuals' support," Natasha said. "There are local people who approached me to offer cash and raffle donations before I even had a chance to really advertise the Walk.

"Everyone being so willing to support this walk, in honour of my mum makes me realise how much they loved and respected her."

Honour Your Heart will be held on Saturday, July 26. Sign-on is on the day and will start with walkers congregating at the Warialda Recreation Grounds in Holden Street at 9:30 for a 10:00am start. The walk will take supporters on a leisurely and very picturesque five kilometres around Warialda, taking in some of the prettiest aspects.

There will be maps and a short course. The finish is at The Royal Hotel in Hope Street, for a cool refreshment and a chance to take home some of the fabulous raffle prizes and auction items, generously donated by locals.

"I'll also have information there on how to go about having your heart checked, who to contact, what is involved and also any warning signs of issues."

Bingara U3A goes down the Silk Road

At the end of April, a number of U3A members had a memorable trip down the Silk Road as silk-scarf artist and Bingara U3A member, Lyn Daley-Lovett showed us how to make some truly lovely silk scarves.

The scarves start off life as rectangular pieces of white silk, then, with the application of protein dyes and the magic of the microwave, are transformed into beautiful accessories. Lyn showed us some of her work to try to unleash the inner artist in us and then showed us a range of dyes in the most vibrant colours. Some of us were very clear on what colours we wanted to use, others were rather vaguer and more needed a bit of encouragement.

The technique basically involves scrunching up the silk, developing a pattern using drops of dye and poking the dye with your finger to ensure it goes right through the fabric. The clever part of course, was the choice of colours and the development of the pattern so that some colours merged into others and some colours only appeared in a particular place such as the ends of the scarf.

Once the creator is satisfied with the colours and patterns it's into the microwave. After the cooking is the exciting part – what does it look like? Onto the ironing board to fix the dyes and there it is – a beautiful scarf. All were quite different as they were done by different people. Interestingly, two people used the same three colours and came out with totally different scarves. One was very bright in colour and the other was almost pastel.

This was an excellent way to spend a morning. Thanks to Lyn for sharing her time and expertise.

With families and individuals feeling the pinch due to rising cost of living pressures, Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall has today thrown his support behind a new State Government campaign to promote the many rebates and savings offered through Service NSW.

Mr Marshall said his new Cost of Living flyer would be hitting mailboxes across the electorate, highlighting some of the more popular and new savings currently available to families across the region.

"There are more than 70 programs across government agencies which aim to put hard

earned dollars back in the pockets of residents and to provide stimulus for local businesses," Mr Marshall said.

"While many have been around for a while, there are a number of new initiatives that have been introduced more recently to help including the \$50 Stay NSW vouchers, \$250 Parents NSW vouchers and additional Dine and Discover vouchers.

"With the current high price of fuel at the bowser, I encourage everyone who is eligible to access the Regional Seniors Travel Card, which is now in its third year.

"The card can be used to buy fuel at service stations, convenience stores or mixed businesses that operate with a fuel merchant category code, alongside taxi and private bus services.

"Not everyone who is eligible is accessing the rebates and savings available to them and so I implore those who are starting to feel the pinch to jump online and see what they can claim."

Mr Marshall also encouraged locals to book an in-person appointment with a Service NSW Savings Specialists, who provide personalised assistance to find which initiatives are best suited to a family's individual needs.

"On average, Savings Specialists have assisted households to put \$770 back into their bank accounts," he said.

"My message to local families is simple – do yourself a favour and give the Savings Finder program a go or book an appointment with a Savings Specialist."

WORK STARTS ON \$11.54M SEALING **OF IB BORE ROAD AT NORTH STAR**

WORK to completely rebuild and bitumen seal the IB Bore Road near North Star has officially commenced, with Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall recently joined by Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Sam Farraway and Gwydir Shire Mayor John Coulton to inspect and drive the critical northern freight route.

Mr Marshall said IB Bore Road was a key transport route for thousands of tonnes of agricultural produce onto the Newell Highway.

"For broadacre farmers in the north of the golden triangle, IB Bore road is vital for getting product from paddock to market quickly and efficiently," Mr Marshall said.

"Work is now underway to rebuild and bitumen seal a 20 kilometre section of the road, between North Star and the Newell Highway, to a standard suitable for heavy vehicles.

"Anyone who has travelled this road in its current state knows how rough it is on vehicles and passengers.

"This work will address significant corrugation which has existed for many years and improve the roads durability during wet weather.

"The incredible amount of rain over the past twelve months has significantly delayed the project, however Gwydir Shire Council has now completed drainage works and anticipates earthworks will commence in July, with the first section of bitumen sealing set to start in September.

"With the re-sheeting of Getta Getta Road east of North Star funded and scheduled for later this year, growers are set reap the financial benefits of a high-quality heavy vehicle freight connection feeding to Moree and Goondiwindi."

Gwydir Shire Mayor John Coulton said the upgrade to IB Bore Road was a welcome improvement for residents who travel this road daily.

"Locals have had to endure substandard road conditions for many years, this development will make their everyday commute much more pleasant," Cr Coulton said.

The significant project has been jointly-funded by \$9.54 million from the State Government's Fixing Local Roads program and a further \$2 million from the Federal Government's Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program.

NSW DPI MANAGES MAJOR PARTHENIUM INFESTATION AT CROPPA CREEK

Biosecurity specialists are successfully managing a 65-hectare parthenium weed infestation near Croppa Creek after an observant agronomist found the weeds hidden in a sorghum crop and reported it late last year.

Farmer Lyndon Mulligan contacted Gwydir Shire Council and is now working as part of the team, led by NSW Department of Primary Industries (DPI), which has treated thousands of parthenium weed plants found on the farm with herbicide.

"We have never had parthenium weed on the property and we are all fortunate that parthenium weed is taken seriously in NSW," Mr Mulligan said.

"As farmers managing this outbreak, we appreciate the specialist support from NSW DPI, Local Land Services, Gwydir Shire Council and Moree Plains Shire Council.

"Parthenium can only be successfully managed and kept out of NSW through the continued cooperation, support and hard work of government and the community."

NSW DPI State Priority Weeds coordinator, Nicola Dixon, said the source of the infestation could be equipment used to harvest a forage sorghum crop in May 2021.

"The harvest contractor had previously worked in Central Queensland – an area well-known to have widespread parthenium weed infestations," Ms Dixon said.

"It's a reminder to ensure machinery and vehicles which have been in Queensland

are cleaned before they are permitted to enter their property."

Mr Mulligan said the machinery appeared clean during a general inspection.

"In future I will ask more questions before machinery enters the farm and find what checks have been undertaken on equipment from Queensland at the NSW border," he said.

Growers are urged to ensure equipment from Queensland is free from all plant material, dust, soil and accumulated grease or has been treated with a seed sterilant before entering NSW.

Operators of all machinery, not just grain harvesters, have a legal duty to prevent their equipment from spreading parthenium weed into NSW, which is covered by the General Biosecurity Duty under the NSW Biosecurity Act 2015.

The infestation at Croppa Creek is the second found in the area and the 42nd parthenium weed incursion detected in NSW since April 2020, following increased movement of hay and grain into NSW from Queensland during drought.

Incursions of the weed have been traced to hay, grain, vehicles and machinery brought into NSW from Queensland.

NSW has benefited from the program to keep the state parthenium-free since 1982 as NSW DPI continues to coordinate statewide surveillance of known high-risk areas in collaboration with local councils, weed control authorities and LLS.

People who suspect they have seen parthenium weed can call the NSW DPI Biosecurity Helpline, **1800 680 244**, or local council for identification and assistance.

Parthenium weed, Parthenium hysterophorus, spreads rapidly, is dangerous to grazing animals, can host crop viruses and reduces land values. Contact with the plant or pollen can cause serious allergic reactions in people.

More information about parthenium weed and how to identify the plant at different growth stages is available from the NSW DPI website.

2.1 Million Upgrade of Oregon Road complete

A multi-million dollar upgrade to one of the Gwydir Shire's most used unsealed roads is now complete, with Northern Tableland MP Adam Marshall, Minister for Regional Roads Sam Farraway and Mayor John Coulton recently inspecting the completed work on Oregon Road.

In 2021 the government contributed \$1,790,525 towards the \$2.1 million project, through round 2 of the NSW Fixing Country Roads program.

Mr Marshall said a 27 kilometres of Oregon Road had been upgraded to provide all-weather access for local traffic and heavy vehicles.

"Oregon Road is the most direct route to Warialda for farmers and families in the highly productive Crooble and Croppa Creek areas," Mr Marshall said.

"The road has long been in need of improvement, with a lack of gravel resulting in its surface becoming impassable after the smallest rain event.

"Additionally, throughout the drought, council had to cease all maintenance on the road due to a lack of water and this has had a significant impact on the quality of the road base.

"Council has now delivered all-weather access to Oregon Road by re-sheeting the surface with a dust suppressing binder and suitable gravels.

"Long-term, this project will pave the way for permanent road train traffic along Oregon Road, in-line with the planned Warialda High Productivity Vehicle Route.

"All weather access will improve the travel time for freight but most of all make for a smoother and safer ride for locals who live in the area."

Gwydir Shire Mayor John Coulton said Oregon Road has never looked better and the works had significantly improved the usability of the road.

"The high standard of work completed will ensure motorists can comfortably travel the road in all weather conditions," Cr Coulton said.

Minister for Sport, Richard Colbeck, said the program will have wide-ranging benefits for local communities.



Mr Hay launched the book, a detailed look at women's cricket, at the Warialda CHSP building on April 6.


It was obvious to those in attendance that Mr Hay is a wealth of knowledge when it comes to cricket and has a genuine love of the sport.

WEST SIDE STORY - MUSICAL GREAT FEATURES AT THE ROXY THIS MAY

The North West Theatre Company Film Club's offer for May is the musical film *West Side Story.* This is a 1961 American musical romantic drama film directed by Robert Wise and Jerome Robbins.

The film is an adaptation of the 1957 Broadway musical of the same title, which in turn was inspired by Shakespeare's play *Romeo and Juliet*. It stars Natalie Wood, Richard Beymer, Russ Tamblyn, Rita Moreno, and George Chakiris. The music was composed by Leonard Bernstein, with lyrics by Stephen Sondheim.

Released on October 18, 1961, the film received high praise from critics and viewers. It was nominated for 11 Academy Awards and won 10, including, becoming the record holder for the most wins for a musical.

West Side Story is regarded as one of the greatest musical films ever made. It holds a 93% rating on Rotten Tomatoes, based on 108 reviews, with an average rating of 8.4/10; the site's critical consensus states: "Buoyed by Robert Wise's dazzling direction, Leonard Bernstein's score, and Stephen Sondheim's lyrics, West Side Story remains perhaps the most iconic of all the Shakespeare adaptations to visit the big screen."

Writing in 2004, Roger Ebert included the film in his list of Great Movies':

"So the dancing is remarkable, and several of the songs have proven themselves by becoming standards, and there are moments of startling power and truth. *West Side Story* remains a landmark of musical history," he said.



Landholders urged to notify and follow rules of safe burning

Residents and landholders are reminded of the need to notify fire agencies before lighting hazard reductions and pile burns now that the statutory Bush Fire Danger Period (BFDP) has come to a close in NSW.

An online portal provides NSW residents the ability to quickly and easily notify fire services when they're planning to use fire on their property.

Using their mobile phone or desktop computer, residents and landholders can lodge their notification of a planned hazard reduction or burn off 24 hours a day, 7 days a week via the RFS portal.

NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) Inspector Scott Mack said that by notifying their neighbours and using the online tool at **www.rfs.nsw. gov.au/notify**, users can help prevent unnecessary emergency calls.

"Over coming months many landholders may take the opportunity to burn off – but it's important they do it safely and let us and their neighbours know.

"While the official BFDP has concluded, landholders still need to make sure they've obtained any required permits and permissions, as well as notifying neighbours and fire authorities 24 hours before lighting up.

"The online tool makes it easier to notify the NSW RFS before

conducting your burn.

"If fire services know about a planned burn, it can help prevent unnecessary responses from local firefighters when we know it is planned and controlled.

By using the online notification tool, landholders will also be notified of any Total Fire Bans or restrictions and if so, will be advised to not proceed with their burn.

NSW RFS Inspector Scott Mack said while landholders are encouraged to reduce fuel loads on their property, it is imperative that it is done so safely and legally.

"Before lighting any fire you need to have adequately prepared fire breaks and have firefighting equipment on hand to ensure the fire does not escape.

"Every landholder has a responsibility to prevent fire spreading from their property and there can be serious consequences for people who light fires and leave them unattended," Inspector Mack said.

To notify of your intent to burn off, use the online burn notification tool at **www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify**. Landholders can still notify the NSW RFS by contacting their local Fire Control Centre.

BANKING ON LIVESTOCK AND PASTURE GENETICS

Valuable livestock and seed genetics will be preserved through the Liberal and Nationals Government's \$8.2 million commitment to national genebanks.

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


BOM CLIMATE OUTLOOK SUMMARY

- May to July rainfall is likely to be above median across most of Australia (chance of exceeding median is greater than 60%), but below median likely for south-west Western Australia and western Tasmania, with north-western and inland regions very likely to be above median (greater than 80% chance). However, the south-west quarter of WA, and western Tasmania have roughly equal chances of above or below median rainfall (chance of exceeding median is close to 50%).
- Days likely to be warmer than average for northern, western, and south-eastern Australia. May to July maximum temperatures are likely to be above median for the northern tropics, south-west WA, south-east NSW, southern and eastern Victoria and Tasmania (greater than 60% chance). Below median maximum temperatures are likely for much of central WA, the southern NT, SA, southern Queensland, inland NSW, and northern Victoria (chance of exceeding the median is less than 40%).
- Past accuracy for May to July rainfall is moderate to high for most areas of Australia, with low accuracy for small parts of the northern tropics, far eastern Victoria, and southern Tasmania.
- Climate influences include the weakening La Niña, the Indian Ocean Dipole and other localised drivers.
